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Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Congratulates Member, Regina Benjamin, On United States Surgeon General Confirmation

WASHINGTON—Cynthia M. A. Butler-McIntyre, National President of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., extends congratulations to member, Regina Benjamin, on her recent confirmation for the position of United States Surgeon General.

The 96-year-old public service Sorority is the single largest African-American women's organization in the country. Benjamin, a native of Alabama, was initiated into the organization in 1976 through the Gamma Alpha Chapter at Xavier University in New Orleans, La. Benjamin is the founder and CEO of the Bayou La Batre Rural Health Clinic in Alabama, which aims to provide primary care to people of any age regardless of their financial situation.

President Obama nominated Benjamin to serve as the United States Surgeon General on July 13. Her nomination was unanimously confirmed by the U.S. Senate on Oct. 29.

“The members of Delta Sigma Theta congratulate our soror, Dr. Regina Benjamin, on receiving this deserving nomination,” said Butler-McIntyre. “Her compassionate approach to healthcare exemplifies the Sorority’s mission of service and continues to build upon the legacy of Dr. Joycelyn Elders, Dr. Alexa Canady, Dr. Velma Scantlebury and other phenomenal physicians of Delta Sigma Theta. Her work in the field of healthcare is a shining example of our biennial theme, *‘A Sisterhood Called to Serve: Transforming Lives, Impacting Communities.’*”

Benjamin attended Morehouse School of Medicine and went on to earn a medical degree from the University of Alabama at Birmingham and a master's in business administration from Tulane. She served as associate dean for rural health at the University of South Alabama College of Medicine. In 1995, Benjamin became the first physician under the age of 40 and the first African-American woman to be named to the American Medical Association's Board of Trustees. In 2002, she became president of the Alabama State Medical Association. Benjamin has received numerous awards and recognitions, including the MacArthur Genius Award.
